Juror's Statement

I was honored to be invited to jury the 2008 Regional Biennial Juried Sculpture Exhibition. Being the exhibition juror for this new program, I was aware that I needed to clearly respect the standards and ideals of sculpture since it is being installed at the Marshall M. Fredericks Sculpture Museum. When entering the museum, one is in awe of the amount of work and dedication to sculpture exhibited over the lifetime by this one great individual: An overwhelming site to contemplate just how incredible and powerful the creative process is from small personal objects to monumental sculptures.



I was delighted to see many well known artists submit to this exhibition. It showed the respect the sculptors have for the Museum and Saginaw Valley State University.

Jurying from slides is always difficult and sometimes requires extra care in deciding the merit of the works. Also, I found giving top awards of such generous amounts to be a pressure-filled anxiety inducing event. I would have preferred to award prizes from the actual objects, but since it was not possible, I very seriously considered selecting the most worthy submissions. There will always be controversies and various judgments made with any art show that reflects an individual's subjective direction or taste. Each show has a personal imprint.

The great variety of submissions made it a pleasure for me to select sculptures that dealt with the traditional figurative elements, abstractions, assemblages, and forms and materials that reflect sculptural methods that are modern yet hold onto the history of this great ancient art form. Surprising, experimental and conceptual process art was absent in favor of well crafted and clearly defined image making.

I would like to thank Marilyn Wheaton and Andrea Ondish for having faith in me that I would select an exhibition that reflects the best standards and tradition of regional sculpture. Working with Andrea made the process much easier and her knowledge was extremely helpful.

Again, thank you for allowing me to jury this exhibition. Hopefully future exhibitions at the museum will continue to attract Michigan's best sculptors. This gives the public an opportunity to learn and see the creative contributions artists make in their communities.


